The Environment & Climate Emergency Policy is an internal document setting out our strategy to reduce the carbon footprint of the council and its operations as part of our response to the Climate Emergency. The council's commitment to reach net zero carbon emissions by 2030 and make Wirral more climate resilient is likely to have a very positive impact on the Council workforce and residents of Wirral. Climate change projections suggest that we can expect hotter summers and milder winters; drier summers and wetter winters and an increase in the frequency and severity of extreme weather events, such as heavy rainfall, droughts and heatwaves (IPCC,	The Environment & Climate Emergency Policy itself addresses potential negative impacts of climate change and ways to simultaneously tackle inequality. impacts for everyone in Wirral, the impacts are likely to be more severe for more vulnerable members of the community. By working to ameliorate global climate change at a local level and bolstering Wirral's resilience against the negative impacts of climate change such as sea level rise, flooding, and heat waves, having an up-to-date action policy is considered to have a positive impact compared to not having a fully supported policy in place, and, as such, should benefit all affected groups.

When implementing the policy, it will be important to ensure climate emergency actions reach all areas of the borough and socio-economic groups to reduce existing inequalities. Lower income groups are considered to be less resilient to the impacts of climate change due to limited resources to respond. At the same time, some of the more affluent areas to Wirral are also the most exposed to significant flood risk such as Hoylake, West Kirby and New Brighton. For this resilience and adaptation has been developed to counter against flooding and coastal risk. Like the Wirral-wide Cool2 Climate Strategy which the CEAP contributes to, the action policy must promote a "just transition" to net-zero carbon emissions. ensuring the benefits and burdens are shared equally and do not have any adverse effects on the vulnerable (Cool Wirral Partnership, 2019).

importance of improved air quality and diet for both Wirral's environment and the population's health. The cycling scheme within the transportation strategy promotes active travel which will also bring health and climatic benefits. As part of the carbon capture action strategy, doubling tree canopy cover across the borough will contribute to carbon offsetting as well as more pleasant and healthy environments for residents. Staff investments via carbon literacy training across the council will also raise awareness of climate and related justice issues and how to tackle them. The action plan will be regularly reviewed, and its impacts monitored, to see if it is fulfilling the purpose of the environment and climate emergency policy.
