The strategy will seek to ensure that services are targeted to young people in a way which will engage them, using media of their choosing. Education for children and young people on respect, healthy relationships and domestic abuse are a priority in the strategy and associated delivery plan. The impact of domestic abuse on children and young people has wide ranging consequences, including the perpetuation of abusive cycles within families & communities. Young men and women are disproportionately affected by Forced Marriage. Campaigns to recognise, raise awareness and provide support are part of this strategy.	
Elder abuse and domestic abuse of older victims is a taboo issue. Expectations of partnerships/family life in previous decades included a level of acceptance around domestic abuse. Older victims may feel less able to identify abuse in their own relationships, particularly where the abuser has a caring role.	
Older victims in long standing relationships may feel less able to acknowledge options open to them. The strategy will involve targeted activity to engage with older victims and the understand the support they require.	
Older female victims may have reduced access to individual savings/pensions due to gender inequality in public policy. Older victims may wish to access support in different ways.	
As part of this strategy there will be specific research and engagement with older people and services which support them to improve their access to domestic abuse services.

Sexual Orientation	 Positive Victims from LGBQT communities are often victims of hate crimes in tandem with their domestic abuse. LGBQT victims bear a double burden in this regard. Perpetrators may threaten to "out" victims. LGBQT victims may yet to define their status or their relationship with their abuser. Domestic abuse awareness campaign images must include a wide variety of relationship and family types. This is necessary to enable victims to identify abuse in their own relationships. Victims beginning new lives as LGBQT may experience post-relationship harassment and abuse from a previous partner. The strategy will ensure that those communities have accessible services and 'walk in' facilities at hand to receive support.
