The proposed 20mph zone areas encompass large residential and business areas and it was agreed with Legal Services that the most effective consultation would be via publication of press releases, social media alerts, public notices and Wirral Council's engagement tool 'Have

Your Say' website which satisfied the consultation requirements listed under Section 7 of The Local Authorities' Traffic Orders (Procedure) (England and Wales) Regulations 1996. The link to the webpage is <u>https://haveyoursay.wirral.gov.uk/20mph-speed-limit-scheme</u> The statutory element of the process took place during October and November 2022 with a deadline for feedback of 30th November and there have been numerous associated press releases and social media posts directing the public to the council's dedicated "Have your say" webpage for this scheme. The webpage gives background details, maps and other information along with the opportunity to take a survey and leave feedback. The website also provides a direct email address for a dedicated inbox specifically for this scheme, so that the public may send further details or comments to substantiate the survey they took, or for those that might not feel comfortable registering and filling out the online survey. Public notices were also placed in the Wirral Globe and throughout the areas within phase 1 of the scheme with details of the proposal and information on how to provide feedback via the "Have Your Say" page or in writing to a postal address. The advertisement of public notices in the local newspaper publications and on-site form part the statutory legal part of the process.

Before you complete your consultation, please email your preliminary EIA to <u>engage@wirral.gov.uk</u> via your Chief Officer in order for the Council to ensure it is meeting it's legal publishing requirements. The EIA will need to be published with a note saying we are awaiting outcomes from a consultation exercise.
